

A Worst-Case Scenario

 If we try to understand the world without realizing that there are spiritual forces at work, we won't understand the world properly "There are two equal and opposite errors into which our race can fall about [demons]. One is to disbelieve in their existence. The other is to believe, and to feel an excessive and unhealthy interest in them. They themselves are equally pleased by both errors and hail a materialist or a magician with the same delight."

A Worst-Case Scenario

- If we try to understand the world without realizing that there are spiritual forces at work, we won't understand the world properly
- The demons know exactly who Jesus is, but they are opposed to Him
- Jesus sees the man, not the stereotype or label

A Power Encounter

- Jesus' conversation with the demon-possessed man isn't a conversation between equals - Jesus has all the power
- Jesus shows that the man is more important than thousands of pigs
- Jesus' miracle shows that sin leads to death
